An Introduction to the Book

Our postage stamp collection is unique, focusing on stamps related to *Gemstones, Minerals, Jewelry, Clocks, Coins-Numismatic, Gold & Silver*, and even Artwork carved from Gemstones. This collection includes over 10,000 individual items and more than 25,000 pieces when considering variations and additional Paraphernalia all related to the world of Gems and Jewelry, and non-philatelic material, such as Cinderella.

The book is divided into two main sections: **General Articles** and **Stamp Posters**. The General Articles provide an overview of stamp collecting and telling the story of how a stone becomes a jewel, along with details about our stamp website, Making of a Museum, Special Artwork – Carved and Created from gemstones like Ashtapad and Ratna Mandir. The Stamp Poster section features 73 posters, showcasing various aspects of the subjects mentioned above.

The stamps in the collection highlight the cultural identities of various countries, featuring gemstones, crafts, and iconic products. For example, Clocks symbolize European heritage, Jewelry reflects ancient civilizations, Coins reveal historical progress, and Gold & Silver represent cultural legacy.

"Romancing the Stone" Section – Gemstone, Jewelry, and Other Posters

The "Romancing the Stone" section showcases a captivating collection of posters on the *above-mentioned* subjects. Each poster features stamps along with its variations, which may include categories like Rough Stone, Cut Stone, Jewelry, Block, Meter Mark Cancellation, Souvenir Sheet, First Day Cover, Error, and Proof. Alongside the stamps, there is a brief description of each stamp, highlighting its features and the country of origin. This is followed by the image of a rough stone, along with an image of an idol carved from the named stone.

Special Section: Gemstone Carvings and A Work of Art

The Special Section is dedicated to the art of gemstone carving. While working with rough stones, I started exploring ways to transform them into works of art. This led to the creation of religious idol carvings using stones I had collected from around the world. Subsequently, a temple was carved with gemstones, namely Ashtapad.

The Ashtapad Maha Tirth – Mountain, carved from crystal, which has 24 niches, each having a gemstone idol. The Navkar Mantra poster showcases both a gemstone carving and a painting, while the Ratna Mandir poster presents a collection of gemstone idols to be displayed in an Art Gallery. A write-up accompanies each piece, giving details about the idols.

An Introduction to the Book

General Section: Philatelic Terms and Collectibles-Non-Philatelic Material

The general section delves into topics commonly encountered in philatelic collections, including paraphernalia like **Postal Covers, Envelopes, Meter Mark Cancellations, First Day Covers, Errors, Proofs, Full Sheets, and Other Related Materials**. Additionally, the section includes explanations of terms that are frequently used in the philatelic world, helping to familiarize both newcomers and experienced collectors with the terminology as given in the General Article section.

This material provides an added layer of interest for collectors, offering a broader perspective on how gemstones and related subjects are depicted across different forms in addition to philatelic items, the exhibit also includes non-philatelic material, valued for its advertising potential and as souvenirs. of art and media.

Story of Stamp Collecting

I lived in a small village in North Gujarat where I studied up to class 6, and I then moved to Jaipur for further studies in 1946-47. Our office and the residence were in the same building in Jaipur. So, whenever I got time, I would go to the office. There I saw some envelopes that the office received from India and Burma. My uncle used to get some mail from Africa as well with interesting stamps. These envelopes had nice looking stamps, which started to appeal to me. Hence, I started collecting those envelopes which I would wash to get the stamps separated from the envelopes.

Independent India had nice stamps, regular as well as special ones which I had collected. India had one stamp where the position of Idol was mirrored which made me collect them specifically. I bought a small album and started to put my collection in the album with the help of hinges. Indian stamps were plentiful, so the similar stamps I will make a bunch and tie with a thread. Smaller collections will be stored in special plastic envelopes.

I meticulously followed my collection for a few years. In 1965, I came to the USA for my medical training. Even when I was here, I kept pursuing my collection hobby. In New York, I was following UN stamps as well. In 1976 I moved and settled down in New York and went into Gemstone business. I used to travel to Brazil and other countries where I would buy some stamps of Argentina, South Africa, Kenya, European countries, & so on.

Around 1982-83, I had a chance to visit a local weekly exhibition in a park in Rio de Janeiro. There I saw a couple of African & Kenyan stamps on Gemstones; I liked them and bought them. At that time, I also bought Brazilian gemstone stamps. All these stamps impressed me a lot. And so, I decided to concentrate on Gemstone stamp collection. Later, Jewelry, Clocks, Coins, Gold & Silver were added to this collection.

A time came when I decided to put them all into special albums. As of today, I have many albums containing all the stamps and the envelopes, especially First Day Covers (FDC), organized & classified as per country.

We have collected other philatelic material – Paraphernalia like Old Envelopes, Meter Mark Cancellations. There are some non-philatelic materials also in the collection. There are many albums of these items; we call them Cinderella. They are

not issued by post offices, and they are not authenticated by the government but have their own value. It may be of advertising value or as souvenirs. I started putting them all in albums, duly classified, arranged, and organized.

Now, around 1990, I had started to think of creating a museum of stamps, but it was not practical, as it needed space, staff, and maintenance. All this will cost a lot. Hence, I thought of a Web Museum.

We had contacted a web specialist, who would organize the material and create a web museum. He guided us with what information is needed for a web museum, such as country, stamp value, print date, and so on. To fill in all the required information for over 10,000 items wasn't an easy task, and so we had a few students helping us to fill in all the information from the stamp catalogue.

It took over 10 years for the basic details to be filled in. The website was inaugurated during American Topical Association Annual meeting in 2012. I was a member of American Philatelic Society, American Topical Association, and Gem, Mineral, & Jewelry Study Unit (GMJSU). After that, many new items were collected and were added with all the details. Work continued till COVID wave came in late 2019.

Working with Stones

In 1947, I moved to Jaipur from my village to pursue further studies. Our office and residence were in the same building, the office on the first floor and our residence on the second floor. This setup gave me early exposure to office work, which would later shape my business journey.

My father worked with synthetic stones known as "Kharad" in the local language. He worked with Karigars – workers who specialized in cutting, followed by giving the stone a particular shape, and then polishing these stones. The raw material was a stone about the size of a thumb, which would be cut into specific size and shape, such as round, pear, or oval. After giving a provisional shape, the stones were meant to be polished, but the local expertise was limited. As a result, the stones were sent to Rangoon, Burma, for further polishing. Once completed, these stones were labeled "Rangoon Diamonds" and used in costume jewelry. This experience gave me valuable insight into the process of stone cutting, polishing, and trading.

Meanwhile, some of my friends who were working with emeralds encouraged me to join them. Since the work didn't require much from me, I agreed. Around the same time, the foreign market for gemstones began to open up, and the export industry started developing. However, none of the staff in the office knew English, so they asked me to help with correspondence. I would visit them to assist with letter writing and making invoices for export.

In 1965, I moved to New York for further studies. During this time, my uncle sent me some gemstone samples. After finishing my shifts at the hospital, I would head to 47th Street in Manhattan once a week to meet with traders. I would show them the samples, take orders, and then inform my uncle who would fulfill the order for them.

At the same time, my friends would send shipments of cut emeralds, which I would present to traders. Some traders would buy the emeralds right away. Over the course of a few months, once I am able to sell the whole shipment, then I would send the payment to India.

In March 1976, I made a life-changing decision to move to New York with my family, leave medicine, and enter the gemstone business. Having maintained good relationships with traders in Jaipur since childhood, I decided to work with rough

emeralds, importing them from Brazil and supplying them to Jaipur. I operated on an order-supply basis, charging a 10% commission. This gave us our foothold in the market, and the business flourished. I continued this work for 20 years.

In 1980, a new variety of rough emerald called "New Brazil" was introduced. I worked hard to introduce it to the market, when there was a growing demand for calibrated stones. The small size of New Brazil rough was a perfect match for the market's needs, and this provided a significant boost to our business. I also supplied a variety of semi-precious stones, further contributing to the growth of Jaipur's gemstone market.

In 1997, I had a life-altering experience when someone attempted to kidnap me. Fortunately, I wasn't there at the time, and they took another person instead, tragically killing him. This event deeply saddened me and made me reflect on my involvement in the gemstone trade. Slowly, I stepped away from the business and began focusing on other pursuits.

I became involved in the creation of a Jain Temple in New York, which gave me a sense of peace and purpose. I also began carving gemstones to create religious idols based on scriptural rules. One of my notable projects was the "Ashtapad," a sacred structure carved from crystal and colored gemstones, which was eventually installed at the Jain Center in New York.

After completing the temple in New York, I received many requests to create a similar temple in India. As a result, I started working on the "Ratna Mandir" project. This new temple will feature five smaller temples with gemstone idols and an art gallery of religious idols. The project is currently under process and will be completed soon.

Founding of Indian Diamond & Colorstone Association

I moved to New York City in 1976 and joined Gemstone Business with my brother. At that time local dealers and traders started commenting about Indian traders out of jealousy and competition. One night I thought we should respond to these comments, but individually saying anything will not make a good impact. So, I thought we should make an association and then respond which will be meaningful. After discussing this idea with other traders, they supported it. Thus, the Indian Diamond & Colorstone Association (IDCA) was formed.

The Indian Diamond & Colorstone Association (IDCA) is a prominent organization based in New York City, deeply rooted in the trade of Colored Gemstones & Diamonds. Founded in 1984 by a group of Indian origin traders, primarily from Jaipur & Bombay (Mumbai), it has grown into a vital part of the Gemstone & Diamond industry in the United States, especially in New York's bustling Jewelry District.

IDCA was established to support and advocate for Indian dealers who were establishing themselves in the United States, particularly in New York. These dealers were primarily involved in the trade of colored gemstones and diamonds, and they saw the need for a unified body that could represent their interests, provide networking opportunities, and promote ethical business practices. Over the years, IDCA has become a key player in the global diamond and gemstone trade, helping to facilitate business connections, support trade events, and represent the industry in various capacities.



Making of Museum of Gem & Jewellery at Jaipur


The Museum of Gem and Jewellery, a joint initiative by **traders from New York and Jaipur**, stands as a unique educational resource and a source of inspiration for future generations. This one-of-a-kind museum celebrates the extraordinary artistry, craftsmanship, and passion that define Jaipur's gemstone and jewelry trade, preserving the legacy of our forefathers. It is a valuable addition to the city's rich cultural heritage.

Upon entering the museum, visitors are immediately immersed in the world of **Gemstones**, with hundreds of rough and polished stones on display. The exhibits highlight the stunning natural beauty and intricate designs created by nature.

The museum also offers a **Historical Perspective** on the gemstone trade, featuring a photograph from the first gemstone auction in Jaipur in 1948, along with a chronological video documenting the trade's development from 1727.

One of the museum's most intriguing sections is the "Navgraha" exhibit, dedicated to the nine planets in Hindu astrology. The "Navratan" wall showcases nine idols, each representing a planet, and is believed to bless visitors with peace and prosperity. Another display is the **Beads and Carvings** section, which illustrates the craftsmanship involved in creating religious and non-religious carvings from gemstones - one of Jaipur's specialties.

Making of Museum of Gem & Jewellery at Jaipur

A highlight of the museum is the display of Jaipur's signature Kundan-Meena jewelry. Known for its intricate craftsmanship, this jewelry features pure gold (kundan), enamel (meena), and diamonds or gemstones. The museum also showcases a variety of other jewelry styles, including French-enamel, Victorian, Tanjore, Thewa, and Fusion jewelry, as well as silver, fashion, and costume jewelry.

Visitors will also be fascinated by **Bollywood** jewelry collection, which features iconic pieces worn by famous Indian film stars, showcasing the intersection of fashion and cinema in Indian culture. The **16 Shringaar** exhibit is dedicated to the traditional 16 adornments that symbolize beauty and feminnity in Indian culture. Displayed on a figure of a lady, these adornments offer visitors a glimpse into the significance of each piece in enhancing beauty. The **Bridal Jewelry** section further explores the rich cultural heritage of Indian weddings, displaying the different jewelry items worn by the brides.

Explanation of Few Terms used in reference to Postage Stamps Stamps - General: -

- 1. Grade Poor to Fine to Extremely Fine
- 2. Year of Printing Older stamps have better value.
- 3. Paper Is an organic material composed of compacted weave of cellulose fiber
- 4. Ink Soluble printing ink is used. Colors are permanent.
- 5. Gum Mostly use gum Arabic or Dextrin as a base
- 6. Perforation Non-Perforated Is used to separate the stamps. However, sometimes there are exceptions, and stamps are printed without perforations.





- 7. Forgeries There are some fake stamps printed by wrong people.
- 8. Mint & Cancelled Used To prevents reusing a stamp. It has the location of the post office.






9. Some envelopes have a cancellation which relates to piece or to a subject or nonspecific. These envelopes are part of a collection which gives an idea – mine or stone or place, etc.



10. Meter Mark - Special Cancellation – A post office cancellation is called Meter Mark. These cancellations are prepared specifically for that product. It becomes interesting for a collector as it has a specific date and some design on an envelope.




11. First Day of Issue [FDC] – When a new stamp is issued which is put on an envelope and cancelled with special meter mark. It is issued on special occasions with an image and date of issue.





12. Souvenir Sheets are a special edition of a single stamp or a small group of stamps, usually with decorative margins and inscriptions, commemorating a specific event or occasion, a collectible memento for collectors.





13. Personalized stamps – Governments permits to print the stamp with personalized image which are authentic.





14. Proposed Personalized Stamps -



- 15. Measurements is given for top and bottom dimensions 15m x 21mm means its 15mm wide at top & bottom, and 21mm tall on sides.
- 16. Specimen Defacement marking prevent postal use have no postal validity.
- 17. Proof & Essay A proof is a trial printing of an accepted stamp. An essay is a design for a proposed stamp submitted to the postal authorities for consideration but not used, or used after alterations have been made.













18. Block - A block is a group of four or more un-separated stamps.


used to collect, store, and study stamps. We have a lot of items in our collection which are being used as a form of advertising.

Jewelers from Europe used them for advertising their products on a postcard or on an envelope. Clock and Watch companies used them to market their products. Similarly, Miners used postcards with mines & stones to sell their products, and Mining Towns used them to promote tourism. We have special cards - advertising cards with interesting designs by companies which they use for marketing their products.

Cinderella & Mini Ad Cards

A label that resembles a postage stamp, but which is not issued for postal purposes by a government administration. There is a wide variety of Cinderella stamps, such as those printed for promotional use by businesses, churches, or political or nonprofit groups. These mini ad cards are used for advertising purposes.

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Various Groups

All of the stamps have been sorted as per the group where they belong. Once you go in a particular group, it will show names of stones, minerals or categories of jewelry, clocks and coins. All group items or categories are arranged in alphabetical order with a small write up on gems, minerals and various categories. If a stamp belongs to multiple groups, it will show up in all the related groups.

List View and Grid View

Each country and various groups with their categories have been presented in two different views- grid view and list view. In grid view- stamps are arranged in a grid with basic information under each image. In list view- stamps are arranged chronologically in a list format with information given alongside each image in various columns. It can be used as a quick reference for country, group, value, date of issue as well as errors, souvenir sheets, meter marks, first day cover etc. have been marked.

Minerals

This page takes you to various minerals which are arranged alphabetically. For each mineral, a picture of the mineral and description of its color, hardness, density, transparency and occurrence is displayed. It will also depict philately on miners, mining process, transport, equipment etc. Non-minerals like oil, salt, phosphorus etc. are also included.

Jewelry

This page takes you to the fascinating world of Jewelry arranged as per their category with a small write up. All stamps have a picture and a description including classification like earring, necklace or bracelet etc., made from metal, silver or gold, studded or plain, modern or antique and so on. One of the main attractions is the Royal jewelry from Great Britain and from many other countries.

Clocks

This page takes you to the wonderful world of clocks arranged alphabetically as per their category with a small write up. Descriptions include type of clocks- antique or modern, mechanical or electronic, alarm or wall clocks, tower clocks and so on. Stamps related to Time like millennium stamps have also been included.



Clocks group and Gold / Silver group Main Pages

Coins / Numismatics

This page takes you to coins- numismatics arranged alphabetically as per their category with a small write up. This includes antique coins, gold coins, paper currency, financial institutions and so on. Bank notes, commerce, finance etc. and all other related items are included.

Gold/Silver

This page takes you to stamps on gold/silver. Most of the gold/silver items belong either in jewelry, clocks or coins group. Others may be related to gold mining, prospectors, nuggets, utensils, etc.

Stamp Page

A master stamp is the original (main stamp) and all other similar stamps are called variations. They are labeled accordingly as used, souvenir sheets, blocks, proof, assays, error, meter mark, first day cover, postcard etc. Each stamp has a Scott number, a date of issue, value and name of country along with a small description.

All stamps are presented in its actual size and one can zoom in to view the details. When one opens the stamp page, all variations will come up along with the master stamp. Used stamps and duplicates are also shown. Some may have a meter mark which may be interesting.

There are over 5,000 individual stamps, over 10,000 with variations and few thousand envelopes. Newer stamps (over 2,000) as well as meter mark with special cancellations are being added.

The technical details of each stamp in any group will include whether it is mint, used or cancelled, single or block, sheets, perforated or non-perforated, assays, specimens, or souvenir sheets etc.

Souvenir sheets are separated out. Errors include printing errors, overprints, missing values or missing the country name. Some stamps have a change in value and some have change in country name.

There are some stamps which are not printed by the post office. I have included them because it may have a picture and name of a stone which will be of interest from a gemologist point.

We wish to add them as we learn. We need help from collectors who may be kind enough to provide useful information which we will be pleased to add. Your feedback will be appreciated.
